Immediate Importance: AML roll on/roll off dock is unusable as of the writing of this report.

AML is working on it and it is expected to be operational by the time the next barge comes in.

Direction to Manager:

- 1. Police Over-time notations- this information is already on the timesheets. We are working on creating a more efficient system to gather that information in a more useable form.
- 2. MOU For Becky's Place- we are still developing ideas for the MOU. I will be meeting with Jackie and Stan when I return from vacation.
- 3. MOU with Friends of Mosquito Lake Facility- This MOU will be completed when I return from vacation.
- 4. COVID Signs- We have some great, fun ideas for this which need further development. Again, I will have more information after I return from vacation.

Administration

- <u>Vacation</u> I am currently on vacation but I will be working remotely on June 22 and June 24. Jila will be acting Manager while I am gone.
- **Borough Manager Advertisement**: The new solicitation for Borough Manager has been posted and published around the State and beyond. We have received two applications so far.
- <u>Lutak Dock Town Hall Meeting:</u> Meeting will be held in Assembly Chambers and on zoom on THURSDAY June 24 at 6:30 pm.
- **Zoom Bombing.** The Haines Borough has experienced our first episode of zoom bombing at the Public Safety Commission meeting last week. We will be analyzing available options and making changes to prevent this from happening in the future.

Finance

- 2021 Tax Bills to the printer. The 2021 Tax Bills have been delivered to the printer and will be sent out on time (by July 1).
- April was a GREAT month as far as sales tax goes, we are up 46% for the previous year so we are hopefully that we are in fiscal recovery.

Lands

- Dave Long is on board and has been working hard- so glad to have him on staff.
- The Assessor is working on the Annual Real Property Report for the State.

Library

- Interpretive Quilt Show- Features several Haines Quilters
- Summer reading project- go to the library and check it out! We will be counting pages read like last summer.

Port and Harbors

- **Sport Ramp Project**. We have received notification from Hamilton's bonding company to stop paying Hamilton directly.
- Ice House. The ice is full and we are making more!
- Commercial Crabbing Season: Very busy
- Commercial Fishing Season: Opens Sunday

Public Facilities/Public Works

Roads:

- Beach Road Temporary Road- The next phase of the Beach Road temporary road is to dig down to the road bed and remove the debris. The RFP will close 6/22. The debris removal will require approximately 100 truck loads a day for 6 days. We have established the Mud Bay/FAA truck route as the most appropriate route- we request your patience with all of the trucking activity for a week.
- o **Porcupine Road** This road is washing out again. As you know, it is an ongoing issue which requires further discussion.

RFP Issued for the following projects:

o Skyline/Beach Road Lift Station – We have received permission from DEC to proceed as our own General Contractor on this project.

Tourism

- American Constellation We have already had 2 of the 12 American Constellation ships come to town. It had been 622 days since our last cruise ship. We welcomed 82 passengers on our first call date and 124 in the second. We expect approximately 125 for each of the remaining calls.
- <u>DCCED Grant</u>- This an HEDC grant NOT a Haines Borough grant, although the Tourism department is working collaboratively with HEDC on the tourism promotion.
- <u>Fast Ferry</u>- Looks like the Fast Ferry will be resuming operations in July to support the large cruise ships coming to Skagway.
- <u>Heliski Permits</u>- We have had a 4th Heliski Operator request a Heliski permit. It has been denied since it is against code to provide for an additional permit, but the operator, Reggie Crist, will appeal the decision to the Assembly.
- Southeast Conference- Will be held here in Haines September 14 16

M/S Goldberg/Turner. To refund CUP application Fee. Does not need a permit.

Goldberg noted that a CUP was not needed at this time. He discussed the fact that Borough code has no definition for buildings materials and that Yurts are not hard-sided buildings. He suggested a look back at a 2013 code change that was proposed but not followed through on.

Lapham brought up concerns that the yurt is in the original "slump" area & could have safety issues in any future weather event.

Turner asked that the planning commission revisit the question of yurts in the townsite at their next meeting.

Motion carried unanimously.

C: William Joiner & Linda Van Houten-Variance Permit 21-13-Height Restriction-Waterfront Zone.

Goldberg stated that there is no variance on height and made an immediate motion that application fee be refunded. He stated that height is measured from grade and that fill can be added to raise the grade.

Ferrin commented that the borough started plowing past the 4-plex because police officer lived there needed "road" plowed for emergency call outs.

M/S Turner/Ferrin. To recommend to assembly that road be placed back in the ROW, put in Cul -de -Sac, and not accept "road" past Dohrn 4-plex property.



Hi Julie,

Here are my explanations of the ordinances before the assembly:

Ordinance No. __-_ to add to the regulatory definition of "Temporary Use" in 18.20.020

The intention of this proposed ordinance is to clarify what types of structures are not allowed as permanent residences in the Haines Townsite. The sentence added to the definition is, "Temporary use dwellings include recreational vehicles, yurts, wall tents and similar structures." The important word here is "dwellings". Here are definitions from the Code: "Dwelling" means a building used primarily for residential occupancy. "Dwelling unit" means a residential use consisting of a building or portion thereof providing independent living, sleeping, cooking, bathroom and accessory uses.

Temporary dwellings are commonly used when someone is building a home and wants to live on site during construction. A permit is required for this, and is valid for up to 18 months.

The Code already sets a standard for permanent dwellings in the Townsite. Mobile homes and recreational vehicles are not allowed as permanent dwellings in the Townsite outside of mobile home or RV parks. Property values are also protected in 10.60.010: no use will be approved that will materially endanger the public health or safety or substantially decrease the value of property in the neighboring area. This concept is supported in the Comprehensive Plan in 7.13 Objective D: Protect homeowners' investments by minimizing adjacent incompatible land development.

The question that was raised at the Planning Commission's meeting was, "If the Code disallows mobile homes as permanent dwellings in the Townsite, why should it allow fabric structures such as yurts, wall tents, teepees and other similar structures?" The addition of "yurts, wall tents and similar structures" to the definition of "temporary use dwellings" answers this question by disallowing them as permanent dwellings in the Townsite. Yurts and other fabric structures are by their nature mobile. A yurt is defined as a fabric covered structure with a collapsible wooden frame, commonly used by nomadic peoples in Central Asia. They, like wall tents and teepees, are designed to be picked up and moved.

This ordinance does not prohibit yurts and other fabric structures from being used as dwellings outside of the Townsite.

This ordinance does not prohibit yurts and other similar structures from being used as an accessory use in the Townsite. Accessory use is defined in Code as "a use or structure customarily subordinate or incidental to, and located on the same lot with a principal use, building or structure, and specifically includes garages and required parking areas, storage structures, small parks or playgrounds, living quarters necessary for caretakers, guards or employee overnight accommodations. Small one-story structures (less than 120 square feet in floor area) for "temporary use" do not require a permit." As an accessory use, yurts would be allowed in the Townsite as yoga rooms, artists' studios, accommodations for guests and other accessory uses.

Code section 18.60.020 calls for the permanent nature of structures: G. Foundation. All buildings intended for residential or commercial use shall be placed on a permanent foundation. This section does not apply to accessory buildings such as tool sheds, wood sheds, etc., of 120 square feet or less in area, or temporary uses. Permanent foundations are also defined: "Foundation, permanent" means footings and foundations that shall be constructed of masonry, concrete; or treated wood as defined in the Uniform Building Code. Footings of concrete and masonry shall be of solid material. Foundations supporting wood shall extend at least six inches above the adjacent finished grade. Bearing walls shall be supported on masonry or concrete foundations or piles or other approved foundation systems of a sufficient size to support all loads. It is incumbent on the developer to assure that the foundation is properly designed and constructed. The Haines Borough accepts no responsibility for the stability or future salability of any building due to an improperly designed or constructed foundation.

If the Code is specific in calling for foundations to be permanent, shouldn't we specify that the dwellings placed on those foundations also be permanent? As the Code stands now, a person could lay down four concrete pier blocks, build a plywood floor, set up a wall tent and call it a permanent dwelling. Is this what we want for the Townsite? The Planning Commission thinks that a standard should be set. This ordinance does that.

Dear Mayor Olerud:

We appreciate the presentation on Haines Port Development in which you participated with the Haines Chamber of Commerce last month. As we mentioned at the outset, for landlocked Yukon, tidewater access, is a critical aspect of our economic growth both for our mineral exports and for inbound access to marine transportation. Haines port development plans can positively affect both those concerns.

In the past, the additional 200 km trucking distance to Haines has favoured Skagway as the principal Yukon port. However, the potentially lower cost transportation and terminal options outlined to us, if realized at Haines - in combination with an increased cruise ship focus at Skagway - could change that.

Accordingly, the Yukon Chamber of Commerce supports the Haines marine cargo hub that is proposed to reduce transportation costs to Yukon businesses through increased tonnage consolidated over the Lutak Dock.

We would be pleased to be part of ongoing engagement with Haines Port Development planning.
